This year's Value Education classes emphasized the importance of essential life skills, career development, leadership abilities, and core human values to nurture students into responsible, ethical, and confident individuals. The sessions aimed at balancing both practical and moral aspects, helping students apply these values effectively in real-life scenarios. The communication skills module included topics such as listening, speaking, reading, writing, non-verbal communication, digital literacy, and online ethics. Value Education Report Session 2024-2025

The 2024–2025 academic year value education courses began in July, 2024. Our value education class was comprised of 47 Geography Pass Course 2nd Year, BA Honours Geography 2nd Year and BA Pass Course Political Science 2nd Year students. There were a few themes chosen at the first lesson that would be discussed in the sessions over the next few days. A wide range of subjects were covered in the conversation, such as the significance of soft skills, the utility of family relationships, the practice of reading in libraries, the meanings of culture, the necessity of self-confidence in day-to-day activities, etc. Other topics covered were dealing with anxiety, seeking alternative career opportunities, personality development, regional dialects, indigenous religions, Himachali and Indian folklore, and indigenous languages.

Apart from these above topics some more topics were discussed as communication skills, leadership and management skills, professional skills, universal human values etc.

VALUE EDUCATION SESSION 2024-25

The report outlines the value education sessions conducted for students during the academic year 2024-25. The curriculum of the value education classes was designed on the bases of the objectives of Jeevan Kaushal 2.0 Life Skills by University Gram Commission. The primary objective of these sessions was to impart essential moral, ethical, and social values while equipping students with practical skills that will aid them both personally and professionally.

Key Topics Covered:

Communication Skills

Key Focus: Digital literacy, responsible use of social media, ethics, and cybersecurity **Practical Sessions:**

- Mock Email & Social Media Etiquette Exercise: Students draft professional emails and analyze sample social media posts for ethical issues.
- Cyber Etiquette Quiz: Interactive quiz on digital safety and responsible online communication.
- Role Play: Scenarios where students respond to online bullying, misinformation, or unethical communication.

2. Leadership Skills

Key Focus: Integrity, ethical decision-making, compassionate leadership Practical Sessions:

- Case Study Discussions: Real-life examples of ethical dilemmas faced by leaders and group discussions on possible actions.
- Leadership Role Simulation: Students take turns leading a small group task, followed by peer feedback.
- Self-Assessment Activity: Using leadership trait inventories to help students understand their strengths and areas for growth.

3. Management Skills

Key Focus: Financial planning, time management, resource allocation Practical Sessions:

- Budget Planning Exercise: Students prepare a monthly budget for a student living away from home.
- Time-Blocking Activity: Creating a weekly schedule using time management techniques like the Eisenhower Matrix.



Team Task: Group activity where students plan a mock event within limited resources and time.

4. Personal Skills

Key Focus: Resume writing, interview skills, self-presentation **Practical Sessions:**

- Resume Building Workshop: Students prepare their resumes using templates and peer
- Mock Interviews: Simulated interviews conducted in pairs or with external mentors. followed by feedback.
- Elevator Pitch Practice: Students practice introducing themselves in 30 seconds for networking or interview settings.

5. Universal Moral and Ethical Principles

Key Focus: Non-violence, peace, righteousness, personal reflection **Practical Sessions:**

- Value-Based Storytelling: Students narrate personal or historical stories that highlight moral courage and integrity.
- Ethics Circle: Group discussion on real-world issues (e.g., honesty in exams, sustainability, community service).
- Reflection Journal: Students maintain a journal reflecting on how they practice ethical values in daily life.

Conclusion:

The value education sessions for the academic year 2024-25 successfully helped students develop both personal and professional skills alongside an understanding of universal moral values. These sessions are an essential part of preparing students to face future challenges with confidence, responsibility, and ethical consideration.
